Rabbi Grumbacher Sermon Post-Charlottesville – August 2017

<u>Martin Niemoller</u> (1892–1984) was a prominent Protestant pastor who emerged as an outspoken public foe of Adolf Hitler and spent the last seven years of Nazi rule in concentration camps.

Niemöller is perhaps best remembered for the quotation:

First they came for the Socialists, and I did not speak out— Because I was not a Socialist.

Then they came for the Trade Unionists, and I did not speak out— Because I was not a Trade Unionist.

Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out— Because I was not a Jew.

Then they came for me—and there was no one left to speak for me.

At a rally following the infamous Charlottesville, Virginia incident, Rabbi Michael Latz of Minneapolis offered the following based on Niemoller's quotation.

First they came for transpeople and I spoke up Because God does not make mistakes.

They came for the African-Americans and I spoke up Because I am my sisters' and brothers' keeper

And they came for the women and I spoke up Because women hold up half the sky

And then they came for the immigrants and I spoke up Because I remember the ideals of our democracy

And then they came for the Muslims and I spoke up Because they are my cousins and we are one human family

And then they came for the Native Americans and Mother Earth and I stood up Because the blood-soaked land cries and the mountains weep

They keep coming We keep rising Because we Jews know the cost of silence We remember where we came from And we will link arms because when you come for our neighbors You come for us And THAT just won't stand What more can we say?
